Mr. Fraser held several offices in the local Camp and was elected delegate to the first Texas Head Camp and on up to Sovereign Adviser. His great opportunity came in 1913. Sovereign Commander Root died of pneumonia at Hendersonville, N. C. on Christmas eve, 1913. Mr. Fraser has been the head officer of the Woodmen of the World since the death of Mr. Root. Under his leadership the Woodmen of the World has become the strongest Fraternal Insurance organization in the world. We have lost a great leader, a good citizen, a great man who had in mind at all times the needs of the working man and woman. We will miss him. All Woodmen in N. 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HOW TO GET MORE LIGHT for YOUR MONEY

WHEN you buy an electric light bulb, we want you to get all the light your money pays for. Here are five useful hints about lighting.

- 1 Be sure that your lamp bulbs and shades are kept clean and free from dust. Just a little dust or dirt on bulb or shade will cut down the light materially.
- 2 Replace old blackened bulbs with new lamps. A blackened bulb gives less light and wastes the current you are paying for. The new, modern electric lamps do not blacken prematurely because they are gas-filled.
- 3 Be sure that every lamp is placed where its light may be used to best advantage. Trying to read by the light of a ceiling fixture is poor economy, because an inexpensive portable lamp, gives you more light just where you need it.
- 4 Use the right size lamp in every socket. For a hallway or closet it is poor economy to use a large lamp. Likewise, it is poor economy to use a small lamp for reading if it doesn't give the amount of light your eyes require. We will gladly tell you exactly the right lamp to use in every socket.
- 5 This is most important. Whenever you buy an incandescent lamp look for the maker's trade-mark on the end of the bulb. Good lamps are always an economy, because they give more light for your money, because they do not blacken or burn out prematurely, because they do not waste current.

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
