



Farmers of Union County have planted between ten and fifteen thousand acres to lespedeza this spring. More fertile soils will result.

Tom Tarheel says we will never get anywhere' in growing livestock until we learn to produce what the market wants and then put it on the market.

It is possible to dress with simplicity, taste and becomingness, without a great outlay for clothes, say home economic workers for the State College. A good time to start is with the graduation dress this spring.

Farmers of Vance County have organized a poultry association, under the leadership of the county agent. Twenty-five growers have already joined and equally as many more have expressed their intention to join later.

The recent milk campaign in Cleveland County disclosed the fact that of the 4,500 children turning in cards, 1,334 are drinking whole milk, 2,043 are drinking tea and coffee daily and 111 are taking milk to school with their lunch.

E. A. Spencer of Anson County reported to the county agent that he averaged about \$90 per month from seven cows last year. He only bought one sack of cottonseed meal and two sacks of mill feed during the year. He grew his feed at home.
