**Apple Blossoms**

Tallulah Park, Ga., April 4, 1929. The wonderful scenery of Tallulah Falls and vicinity is at this time made more wonderful by the presence of the magnificent apple blossoms covering several square miles of land of the 50,000 apple tree orchards of Louis B. Magid. The many tourists from the North and East returning from Florida are enjoying a wonderful view as the concrete highway runs through the orchards and is partly elevated, giving a good view of a great section of the orchards. Many tourists have expressed surprise that apples are grown in Georgia.

When your correspondent interviewed Mr. Magid he stated that they have the finest bloom in the history of the orchards, and approximately 250 cars of apples are expected this year. In fact, Mr. Magid stated that this would be the first commercial crop the orchards have produced, as they are now at the age to commence yielding commercial crops.

The Magid orchards, the largest in North Georgia, have within the past year been fitted with overhead pipe lines for spraying the trees and fruit. More than 100,000 feet of galvanized steel pipe was used, and two powerful 80-gallon unit pumps driven by 70 h. p. stationary engines are doing the spray work, manned by a personnel of some 25 people, which by the old method of moving spray carts through the orchards would have required at least 25 spray cart outfits, 150 mules, and more than 75 people to man them. "Yes," said Mr. Magid "the original cost of installation of this modern spray system involved a large sum of money, but the saving effected will pay for itself in less than three years." The orchard workers and their families on the Magid orchards number over one hundred people, depending on a living

entirely from the orchard payrolls. Mr. Magid extends through this paper an invitation to all those who wish to see a wonderful panorama of the apple blossoms during the next eight days or so to visit the orchards.
