Cpl. Hensley, a son of the Rev. B. S. Hensley, is a graduate of Barnardsville High School and attended W. C. T. C. at Cullowhee before volunteering for service in July of 1943. After training in the United States he went with the Aviation Engineers into New Guinea and was in the invasion of Leyte. He has been a member of the Baptist church 11 years.


