## Removing Lipstick From Irish Linens

You can remain calm when guests smudge your precious Irish linens with lipstick or rouge, for

the very simple "hotel method" of removing these stains will save your napkins and towels—and save your friendships. The procedure used by hotel housekeepers is to work a colorless grease—such as vaseline, lard or cooking oil into the smudge. This dissolves the stain. Stain and grease can then be removed by sponging with a cleaner of the carbon tetrachloride type or by dipping the spot into the fluid. If stain doesn't all come out, sponge with diluted denatured alcohol.

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# A Valuable Asset to Jackson County

The Harris and Reese Tanning Company was established in Sylva in 1902 by C. J. Harris and Hans Reese. It remained under this management until 1915 when Armour Leather Company took the plant over and increased its capacity for the manufacture of leather for transmission belting and shoes.

The plant is now operated by W. T. Wise, Superintendent, and O. E. Brookhyser, Office Manager. Within the past five years, under the present management, the plant has been practically rebuilt and a lot of new equipment installed.

At the present time 120 men are employed 48 hours per week, with an annual payroll of approximately \$208,000.00. In addition, Chestnut, and Oak bark is bought from the residents of Jackson and surrounding counties to the amount of \$50,000.00 per year.

This Company, the oldest industry in Sylva, plans to maintain its efficiency, and help promote postwar Sylva and Jackson County as it has in the past.
