SYLVA ON NEW POSTOFFICE LIST

Sylva was included in the lis of 24 western North Carolina towns and cities to be benefited by a \$10,000,000 post office construction program for North Carolina, proposing new postoffices, extensions and remodeling in 105 Tar Heel towns and cities, according to a post-war building program submitted to congress Tuesday of last week by the Federal Works agency.

The amount set up for the Sylva post office was \$90,000 provided the legislation is enacted and the program is undertaken.
