President Truman said that he was confident that the congress would pass his labor law by Christmas despite current indications that committee hearings would be lengthy.

And just as confidently the president appointed his fact-finding board for the General Motors strike and predicted both sides would cooperate.

### Old Paper Found By Chick Young During Repair Of Baptist Church

An old paper, The Republic, St Louis, Missouri, and bearing the date line, June 25, 1900, was found this week by Chick Young when some new flooring was being laid in the Baptist church. It was discovered directly under the baseboards and is in a fair state of preservation. The paper is streamered with war news, war news now almost four and a half decades old. The State Department has just released figures showing that 354,000,000 people in the world are suffering from hunger, disease, idleness and poverty, according to a report just received by J. A. Bryson, chairman of Jackson C. Welch. Rev.
