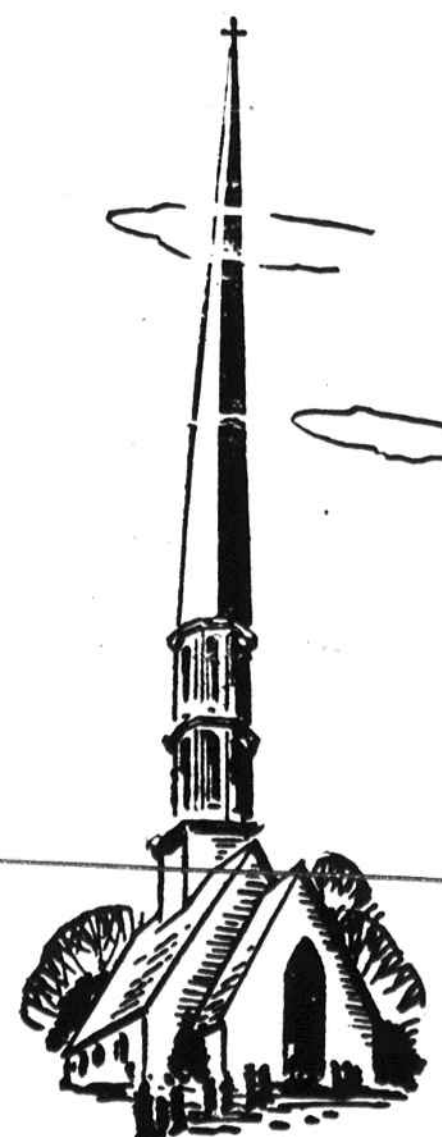

hybrid seed include: Winston Cabe, John Taylor, Ralph Davis, Coy Deitz, Mac Deitz, W. T. Brown, Howard Buchanan, Cecil Alexander, Willard Turpin, O. H. Martin, Bob Warner, Andrew Christopher, Willie B. Hyatt, Paul Buchanan, J. A. Ensley, Dick Mathews, Emory Lee Dillard, Darnel Ward, Posey Cathey and Marvin Allison.

The seed corn to be planted was grown in Buncombe county last summer by Charles Holiday and Hoyatt Plemmons while Mr. J. F. Corbin was the certified seed corn inspector for Buncombe county. Mr. Corbin knows the men and their corn and heartily recommends its planting. He stresses the importance of purchasing seed bagged in the official North Carolina Crop Improvement Association bag. This white bag is recognized by the blue square with a red border at the top and bottom and stamped with a N. C. map in white the wording "Certified Seed—void without certification tag" is printed on each bag. The bag must also bear the official blue tag of certified seed.

### Visual Aid Equipment Added To Department

The Vocational Agriculture department and the Veteran Farmer Training Group have secured a complete line of visual aid equipment to be used in their programs. This equipment includes one 16 millimeter sound movie projector together with two screens; an 8 x 10, and a portable 4 foot square screen; a Triple A millimeter Slide machine; and a Mercury No. 2 camera for making pictures to use in the slide machine.

An added asset to owning this equipment is the ability of borrowing films from the Vocational Agriculture department of Raleigh. The Department has recently set up a film library in order to furnish free films to the V. A. departments of the State.
