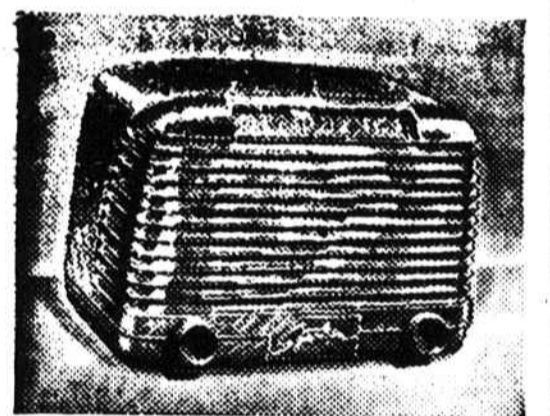
Bridge Club Met With Mrs. Hardy

Mrs. Hardy served a salad course, nuts, and mints.

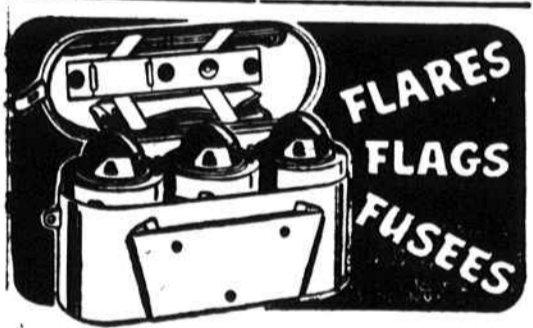
