Plans for the proposed waterworks improvements, which have been under study by the Board of Aldermen for over a year, have been almost completed and the election to be held May 2.

The other seven projects consist of five dams and hydro-electric developments on the east fork of Tuckaseigee River in Jackson County; a dam, tunnel and power house on the Nantahala River between Wesser and the Nantahala power house in Swain County; and a project on the Little Tennessee River near Needmore in Swain and Macon Counties.

The Tuckaseigee River projects will have a combined output of 80,000,000 kilowatt hours annually; the Nantahala River project 82 millions and the Needmore project 146 million kilowatt hours anual-
