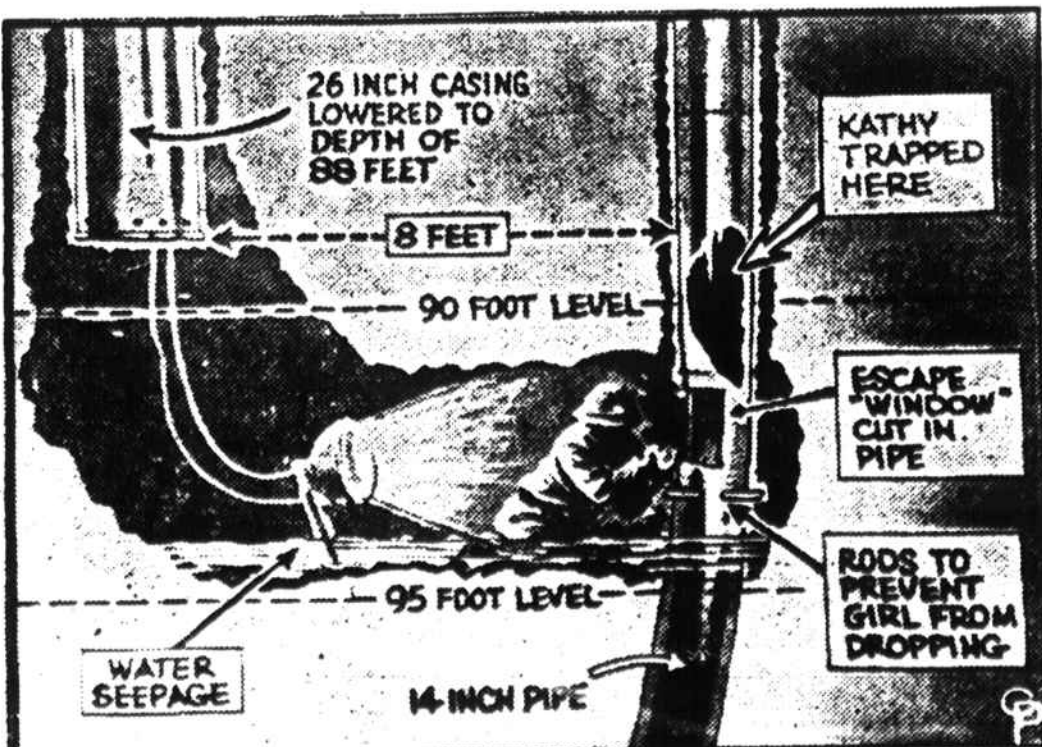

VA ANSWERS TO VET PROBLEMS

A number of veterans each month run the risk of allowing their National Service Life Insurance to lapse because they fail to take a second look before mailing their premium payments, Veterans Administration said. Each month, VA district offices receive checks, money orders and postal notes that cannot be cashed, although they were intended to pay NSLI premiums. Many checks are not signed. Others are made payable to companies and organizations that have no connections with VA.

VA attempts to clear up such mistakes immediately, by writing to the veteran within 24 hours. But his premium cannot be marked "paid" until he sends back a cashable payment. If the veteran who forgets to sign his check is near the end of his 31-day grace period, there is a particular danger that his insurance may lapse, VA said.

Checks, money orders or postal notes should be made payable to the Treasurer of the United States. If, for any reason, the veteran does not have a VA premium envelope and does not know his insurance number, he should make certain his payment is accompanied by his full name, address and armed forces serial number. Q—I am a World War I veteran and was married in 1947. Will my wife be entitled to a pension at my death. A—The law provides that the widow of a World War I veteran may be paid a pension only if she was married to the veteran before December 15, 1944. If she married him after that date, she must have been married to him ten or more years at the time of his death. Q—How does a veteran apply for readjustment allowance? A—A veteran must present his original service discharge or separation paper, or if that has been lost or destroyed, a certificate in lieu of, or a properly authenticated copy of such paper. He must file an application on Veterans Administration Form 4-1382. An initial claim is usually filed at the same time the application is made. This claim indicates whether the veteran is unemployed, partially employed or self-employed. Q—If I accept and cash the compensation check VA has sent me, does that mean I am satisfied with the rating given me? A—No. The acceptance of a check does not waive any rights you have in claiming greater compensation or pension than that which has been awarded you.

Household Hint

The usual home method of cleaning any fur is to rub into it cornmeal that has been dampened with cleaning fluid. When this has dried it can be shaken out and the fur brushed.
