Sylva Lions Club Sponsors Pig Project

The Lions Club of Sylva recently placed two more pigs with agricultural trainees, bringing the number of registered pigs given to farm trainees to four.

The pigs are registered Hampshires, a breed found suitable to our locality to thrive. The two latest porkers were given to Olin Blanton, of Maple Springs, a first year agriculture student in the Sylva high school, and to Pat Nations, of Nation's Creek, also a first year agriculture student.

When ready the pigs must be bred to a registered boar. Lion John Corbin, vocational director of the Sylva schools, selects a pig from the first litter which is given to another of the students to raise under the same conditions. The pig belongs to the student, no strings attached, after the first pig of the first litter is chosen by Lion Corbin.

The pig must be bred to a registered boar approved by Lion Corbin, who states that the strain must be kept pure to increase in value.
