In behalf of the effort in securing an assistant home agent for Jackson county Mrs. Claxton stressed the need and importance of wives, mothers, and girls being taught to sew, cook, and keep house the right way. She said that if the homes in the whole of Jackson were happier homes that there would be fewer people in our jails, and other places of correction.

"We shouldn't just give clothes to the needy," said Mrs. Claxton, "but let them be taught that they can take old trousers and make a snow suit for their child. It doesn't take money so much as it does training for our people. In 4-H club work boys and girls are taught to work with the things they already have," continued Mrs. Claxton. "Girls are taught to sew sometimes using feed sacks or to make over garments. There were five sack dresses modeled in our 4-H Dress Review last June. They were lovely dresses with little or no cost at all. Two of those dresses won 2nd and 3rd place." Mrs. Claxton recognized the fact that home economics is taught in the high schools but, says Mrs. Claxton, "What are we going to do about those who do not go on to high school and those mothers who did not and will not get to go? These, too, are people we need to help."

Dog Quar.

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The following is published for your information:

HANDLING OF DOGS THAT HAVE BITTEN PERSONS OR ANIMALS

Such dogs should not be killed unless it is clear they have symptoms of rabies, and then only if they cannot be apprehended with safety. It is important to know whether the dog is mad. If the dog can be found and kept under observation for ten days and no symptoms appear, the Pasteur treatment is not necessary. The dog should be turned over to the proper authority for observation and study. Animals killed early in the course of rabies may fail to show microscopic evidence of the disease, thus causing a delay in diagnosis. If killed, the head or brain should be sent to a laboratory without delay, and, if a distance, on ice. When this is not practical, the brain should be placed in glycerin.

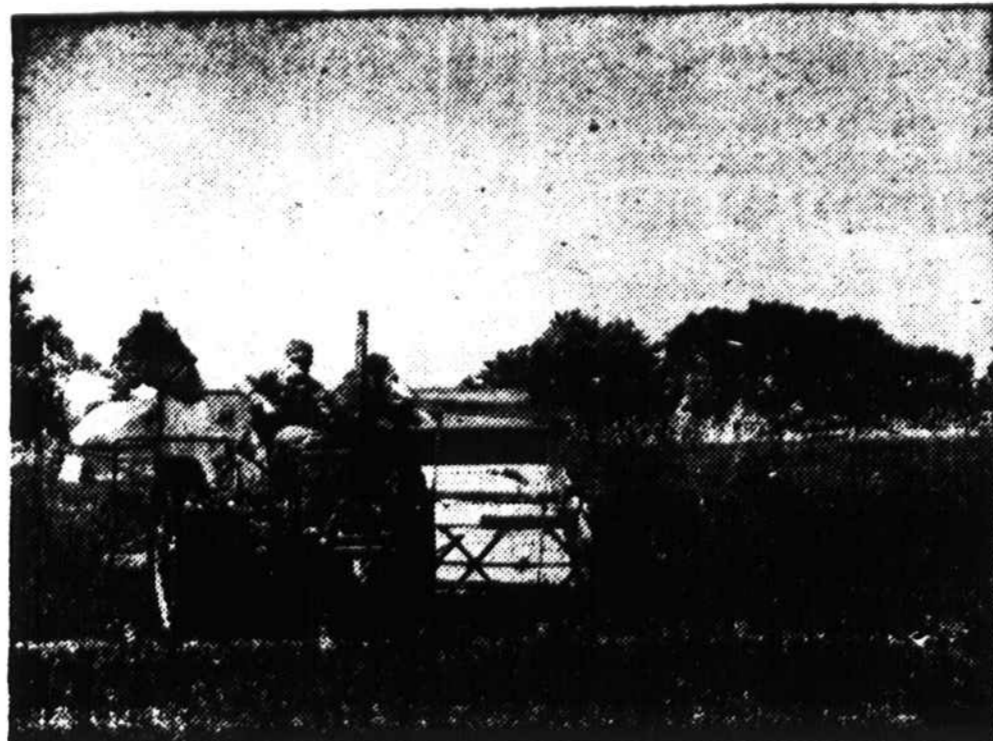
