


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

> Clarence Rickman, 37, of Cove Creek, and Thomas Rich, 35, of North Andover, Mass., white prisoners of the Whittier Prison camp, are said by C. J. Harris hospital attendants to be well on the road to recovery from gunshot wounds received when they attempted to escape from a prison gang on Locust Creek early Saturday morning. The men were in a very serious condition Saturday and both remained in the operating room of the hospital most of the day while local doctors patched them up.

The escape attempt was made when a gang of prisoners were taken from the camp in the prison truck to their place for work on the roads on Locust Creek. 
