
Mr. Drobrovsky pointed out that one of our newest insects of economic importance in Western North Carolina is the screw worm which attacks all livestock. The maggot of the screw worm works included: cattle grub, 1.5 percent in live flesh as well as in dead. controled by use of "Smear 62" which is obtainable from local sprayed on base of tree during druggists. It is highly recommended after all operations which break DDT dust or liquid DDT spray; the animals' skin, such as dehorning, castrating, and cuts from lead with lime; and termites in fences.
