Funeral services are incomplete for Homer Leonard Holden, 47. who died suddenly at his home here Wednesday morning at 1 o'clock. However, the funeral will be in the Sylva Methodist church of which the deceased was a member.

Mr. Holden had been in usual health all day Tuesday and had attended a rehearsal for the wedding of his daughter at the church and on retiring just before 1 o'clock he died almost immediately.


O. E. BROOKHYSER **INJURED IN AUTO** ACCIDENT ON FRIDAY O. E. Brookhyser, office manag-


