**The Newspapers Against Roosevelt.**

**Paid Contribution.**

While those who advocate the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt for a third term of the presidency have every right to their opinion, and perhaps feel that there is some reason for not re-nominating a man for a second term by way of endorsement, the average voter, the American voter who believes in the application of the very theory which Mr. Roosevelt preaches—the square deal—is not going to be stamped by a noisy drum and a big stick. . . . but any fair-minded man will admit that Mr. Roosevelt has acted most treacherously; he has treated his loyal friend in a manner that men who believe at all in the principles of friendship and true manhood will record their verdict against the Lion Hunter.—Asheville Citizen, Mch. 12, 1912.

President Taft has accepted the challenge of Colonel Roosevelt and has joined issue with him in supporting the Constitution of the country in the most unequivocal manner. The President stands for the rights of the minority or the individual against the tyrannous will of the mob carried away by the passions and prejudices of the moment. Such rights must be maintained and guarded. The weak must not be oppressed by the strong. Laws and constitutions must not be changed by catch votes to satisfy a passing whim or to meet the desire of the moment in a particular case. The good of the whole people and the ends of justice for all must be studied with careful deliberation before changes are made. General principles must govern the making of laws.

President Taft said in Toledo last week that we "would have a system of suspending the Constitution to meet special cases" if the Roosevelt ideas were adopted. The greatest of all despotism is a government of special instances. In the days that followed the Norman conquest of England the King legislated in that fashion, no doubt, much to the satisfaction of his satellites and favorites. The President asks, "Can it be that the power of a temporary majority of the electorate, by a single popular vote to do away with the rights secured to the individuals which have been inviolable for seven hundred years, since the days of Magna Charta, approves, in itself to those who love liberty and who hold dear to sacred guarantees?" Roosevelt would do by snap-votes what King John of England did by royal command. There would be no more justice in that case under Roosevelt than under the worst King England ever had.—New York Commercial, March 11, 1912.
