Furthermore the same authority says that by far the greater porticn of thes lands is suitable only for timber growing, which means that they ever again are to serve useful purpose, it will be accomp lished only through a gigantic scheme of reforestation. While this statement may contain nothing new to those acquainted with the situation, it does forcefully cill to mind the fact that utilization of these idie lands is perhaps the greatest economic problem facing the Southern States long as these great cut-over areas present the aspect of a man made desert, the effect will be Juat a unsetting economically as would be the idleness of thousands of fsrmsOf course, considerable progress has been made in the way of e nvarting thousands of acres ductive farms, lut admittedly $t$ iere are great stretches of this land which are better suited to the growing of trees than to the pruduction of farm crops. Many old time lumbermen look ask ance at the idea of raising trees, but it has been amply demonstrated that trees can be planted and grown, practically and profitably. This has not only been done experimentally, but is even now be:ng undertaken as a com mercial proposition by one of the South's largest producers or pine who recognizes that the South's supply of pine timber is waning but is determined that his operation shall have a permament timber supply.
At first glance it might appear that any attempt to reforest the cut-over areas of the South would be an undertaking so stupmight be true of sections of the e) untry where forestry is an in volved process and a century or longer is required to grow mer chantable timber. The South however, is particularly fortu nate in that it nas the combination of a mild climate and, in th various species of pine, a fast growing and prolific commercia clusively that if left undisturbed pine will reproduce itself upon the areas from which the origi nal growth timber has been removed In view of this, the problem of reforestation and inci dentally, cut-over land utilization becomes primarily a matter of provi ling protection from fores fires and other injurious agencies In the South these idle timber lands are generally regarded as a source of enormous potential wealth; yet it seems that their
productive power is not fulls realized. The Forest Service estimates that each of the thirty million aeres of cut-ov r lands, given proper protection, is capgiven of proper protection, is cap-
able prom from 100 to 400 board feet of longleaf pine yearly, tog sther with a steady yield of turpentine Taking a growth of 200 feet per acre as an average this means that there is going to waste every year the equivalent to six billion board feet of lumber This is an economic loss too great out disastrous consequences.
