VANDIVER FUNERAL TO BE HELD TO-DAY

Prominent Lawyer of Asheville to Be Laid to Rest Today in Weaverville Cemetery.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon for Walter W. Vandiver at the family burying ground in Weaverville cemetery at 3:30 o'clock.

Mr. Vandiver died Sunday evening at the home of G. C. Penland, on the Swannanoa Drive, following a lingering illness. The deceased was a prominent lawyer of Asheville for a number of years, later moving to Coweta, Oklahoma, where he was prominent in the civic life of that city. Mr. Vandiver recently returned to Asheville.

He was born in Spartanburg, S. C., in 1857, and later moved to Weaverville, where in 1876 he graduated from Weaver College. Mr. Vandiver later attended Vanderbilt University, and went from there to the University of North Carolina. Two years after completing his college career he was admitted to the Buncombe County Bar.

Mr. Vandiver was a thirty-second degree Mason and was a member of the Methodist Church. He never married. Surviving are two sisters—Mrs. W. F. Cann, of Mobile, Ala., and Mrs. S. J. Ramage, of Asheville—two brothers—John M. Vandiver, of Rome, Ga., and N. F. Vandiver, of this city. The deceased was a nephew of Dr. H. B. Weaver, and Mrs. D. H. Reagan, of Asheville and of Captain W. E. Weaver and Mrs. W. M. Parker, of Weaverville.
