## The General Assembly of North Carolina do Enact

Section 1. That the commissioners for the County of Madison...

Section 2. That the road shall be surveyed and located by a competent engineer...

Section 3. That the commissioners or road authorities of Madison County shall provide the means for the building and construction of said road...

Section 4. That the said commissioners or road authorities may provide any other means for the construction of this road that they may deem expedient and practicable.

Section 5. That the commissioners of Madison County shall provide the finance for the building and construction of said road by Special taxes, by short time loans or by the sale of County bonds, as they may deem most expedient.

Section 6. That the said commissioners shall proceed to have the said road surveyed and located at the earliest time practicable after the ratification of this act...

Section 7. That the said road shall be of such grade and width as to make it a first class road.

Section 8. That all laws or parts or clauses of laws in conflict with this act be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 3. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

## Whiskey Captured at Hot Springs.

Last Thursday night Sheriff Ramsey and his deputies went to Hot Springs and searched the trains that were passing thru. They arrested five men who were on the train. Three of these were hoboes who were riding the train and one was a bootlegger and had a gallon of liquor and the other man arrested was found to be an auto thief wanted at Sevierville, Tennessee, for the theft of a car. Three of the men were sent to the chaingang on Friday and will work out a thirty days sentence before Squire Gudger and twenty days additional for the costs. One of the greatest ways of entrance of liquor is the train as it passes thru and the sheriff in searching these will make the fear of the law a

means of stopping this channel. The railroad authorities are co-operating well with the county officers and gives all aid possible to the county. What the sheriff needs is the co-operation of the good citizens in this work and if the men and women would only help in a short time, we could show that prohibition does prohibit. Tell the sheriff and let him get the men. Sheriff Ramsey says that he will keep to himself the names of the informers and will give good service. He says the county pays him for the danger and the capture and he will safeguard all the people who help him. So if afraid of retaliation, loose it as he will keep secret the name of any one telling of still or liquor and will do his best to rid the county of liquor.
