Moore & Davis who are in charge of the Farm Bureau Warehouse have received a car of specially prepared tobacco fertilizer. This fertilizer has an analysis of 9-2-4-3 instead of the 8-2-2 as ordinarily used for tobacco and in addition the filler is lime and a high percentage of magnesia phosphate. THIS IS 100 PER CENT FERTILIZER. This fertilizer is put up in 100 pound bags and does not eat up the bags with sulphuric acid.

Hooded Bands in Louisiana Will Be Investigated.

Bastrop, La., March 3.—Morehouse parish prepared tonight for another siege of sensations, expected to begin Monday when the grand jury opens a probe of hooded mob outbreaks including the brutal murders of Watt Daniels and Thomas Richards.

Attorney General A. V. Coco and assistants, fortified with voluminous evidence taken in the open hearings a month ago, was expected here tomorrow to open the attack for indictments against 50 prominent citizens, alleged to have murdered, intimidated or flogged those who incurred their disfavor.

The state will seek true bills against at least five persons for the murders of Daniel and Richards, whose mutilated bodies were found weighted down in Lake La Fourche, it was learned. Others may be charged with kidnappings, whippings and deportations during the last year.

COCO SATISFIED.

Attorney General Coco has expressed himself as satisfied with the men selected for the grand jury which probably will be sworn in Monday. The jurors will be selected without regard to affiliations to organizations. Several minor cases probably will be called before the cases of hooded mobs are considered.

When the inquiry into the roving masked bands opens considerable new evidence is expected to be produced. The inquiry will be taken over the ground covered on the open hearings. Bastrop was not perturbed on the eve of the new investigations which may result in an effort to send some of its prominent citizens to the gallows. On the surface citizens were unchallant and care free, seldom even mentioning the pending probe.

Mr. Henry C. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture, in the January issue of American Forestry says: "Among the foolish and thoughtless wastes to which the American people are prone, I doubt if there is any more senseless than burning up year after year millions of acres of areas of young forest growth, to say nothing of the merchantable timber, homes and lives frequently destroyed. To permit this to continue, with the scarcity of timber now so plainly written on the wall and with the known inability of most of this land to grow any other crop except timber, would be financially suicidal."

According to the U. S. Forest Service, 33,000 forest fires occur annually; over 60% are caused by human carelessness. Each year these fires burn over 7,000,000 acres; an area greater than Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Hampshire and Rhode Island combined. These fires cause a loss each year of \$17,000,000.

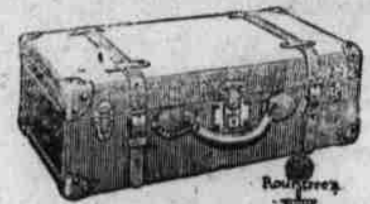

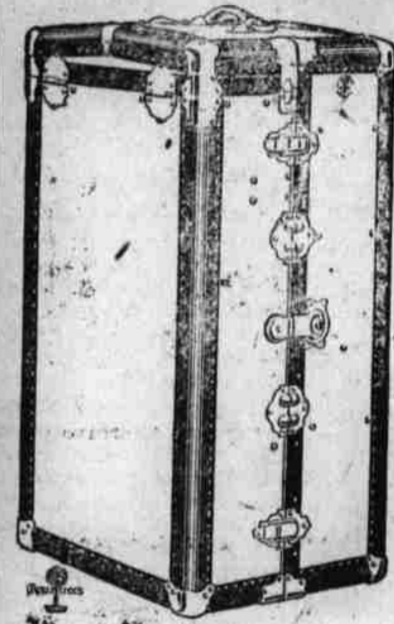
To All Whom It May Concern
