Dr. J. S. Mitchener of the Bureau of Medical Inspection of Schools was a visitor in Marshall Tuesday of this week. The purpose of Dr. Mitchener's visit was to plan with our County Board of Health for a tonsil and adenoid clinic that is to be conducted in Madison County sometime this summer—probably during the month of August. The State Board of Health proposes to send us one of its traveling hospitals consisting of eight trained nurses, thirty beds, and all other necessary equipment for conducting a clinic. They also send us a surgeon who is an expert in the line of tonsils and adenoids. A physician, to be eligible for this work, must have specialized in this field of work and, in addition to this, he must have had at least three years of experience in the work. This assures us that the work will be done by one who knows his business. There will be a charge of \$12.50 for the operation.

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEEMEN MADISON COUNTY

Gentlemen: Section 50 of the new Public School Law reads as follows: The

IMPORTANT MEETING

"The county board of education shall advise with the committee of each district before the May budget is prepared, and seek such information as may be helpful in planning the work for the ensuing year in providing the number and grade of teachers needed and the amount needed to thoroughly equip the school building or buildings in the district."

In obedience to this section of the law, the County Board of Education has decided to call all of the school committeemen of the county together in Marshall on Saturday, April 28th at 10:00 A. M. It is very important that every man or woman who served as a committeemen during this year be present at the meeting. Your presence will have a great deal to do in determining grade of teachers and the kind of school you will have next year. Let us meet 100 per cent strong.

We not only invite the committee but every man or woman who is interested in having better schools. This means both parents and teachers. We are expecting to have several hundred people here on that day. This is, perhaps, the first opportunity that the parents of Madison County have ever had in coming together to plan for their own schools. Let us make it a day to be remembered by all of the people of the county. We can do it if you will only come out and help us. Parents this is your day; make the most of it.

Citizens of Madison County, are you satisfied with the way your money has been spent for schools? Are you satisfied with the kind of schools you have been having? Have we given you just the kind of school that you want? If not, then come to Marshall on Saturday, April 28th, and say so. We are going to give you a chance to say just what you think. Come and say it. We are expecting to have a band to give us some good music. We will also have some short talks by some of our leading teachers and committeemen. But don't forget that we are going to arrange a place on the program for any person who is interested to have his say? Will you come?
