I have been a pastor for twenty years. I have been the pastor of seven churches. He was one of the best deacons and most helpful members I have ever known in any church I have served.

County Summer School Opens May 30th.

The Madison County Summer School for teachers will open, in Marshall Wednesday May 30, and continue for a term of six weeks. We will hold school on the first Saturday and the third Saturday in order to make the full thirty days by July 6th.

The instructors are: Prof. C. M. Blankenship, Principal of Marshall High School; Miss Emma Logan, Science teacher in Marshall High School; and Mrs. Maude Harris Briggs, Primary supervisor in Marion City Schools. These are all very strong teachers and we are sure they will give us one of the very best County Summer Schools in the state.

Holders of Second Grade, Prov. B. Prov. A. and Temporary Certificates are required to attend a summer school if they expect to teach next year. Those holding the Elementary B Certificate may renew their certificate for a term of three years by attending. There are a number of these Elementary certificates that should be renewed this year.

The Summer School will be conducted on somewhat the same plan that it was last year. Miss Kelly will be here on the opening day to help organize the courses. It is important that every one be here on the first day. Those entering after the third day will not be allowed any credit for the work.

Those who expect to attend will please write the County Superintendent just as soon as possible. If any one would like for us to make arrangements for board they will let us know that also.

This scribe attended the close of the Public School at Hot Springs and made the address to the students and those present the enrollment for the term of eight months was 138 average attendance 122 this has been one of the most successful schools that Hot Springs has ever had. Prof. Pipes and three lady teachers have done faithful and permanent work for which they deserve great credit. There are 20 students ready for High School work. Next term the patrons are wanting to put a High teacher next term to take care of the twenty students here. This is very much needed it is true they need a better school building and if these people are encouraged by giving them a high school department in their school, they will purchase a plot of land more suitable than the one they now have and vote bonds and build a six or eight room school building, the county Supt. and the Board will be ready and willing to give them a high school teacher if they can furnish the twenty students. There can be some more territory added to Hot Springs district, and I see no reason why they cannot build a State High School at Hot Springs and with a long pull and a study pull and a pull altogether it can be done as I have said our Supt. is ready and willing to give all aid possible to make the schools of the county to meet the demands of the students, but we must remember he needs our aid and assistance and hope that the parents will give heed to the demand made on them for better and more proficient schools to the end that ever girl and boy may have the chance to get a high training.
