Automobile Stop Law Is Now Effective.

North Carolina's new stop law requiring all automobiles to come to a complete stop at rail way crossings, except where there is a gate or watchman, be comes affective Sunday, July 1, and it is believed will etiminate all grade crossing accidents in the state. 1

The bill was passed during the last session of the General Assembly as House Bill No. 445 and Senate Bill No 1445.

Violation of the law as a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than \$10 or impri sonment of not more than ten days or both.

Stops must be made at a distance not exceeding 50 feet from the nearest rail. Failure to stop does not constitute contributory negligence, but is to be considered in evidence, the law cites.

Railroads are required under the law to post warning signs not less than 10 feet high, 100 feet from the crossing, to be 40 by 50 inches and bearing in red letters the words, "N C. Law. Stop."
