AN ORDER AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$180,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MADISON, NORTH CAROLINA, FOR FUNDING PURPOSES.

BE IT ORDERED by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Madison, North Carolina, as follows: Section 1. Pursuant to the County Finance Act of North Carolina, bonds of the County of Madison, North Carolina, are hereby authorized to be issued in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$180,000, for the purpose hereinafter described.

Section 2. The proceeds of said bonds shall be applied solely to the purpose of funding or paying valid in indebtedness of the County of Madison, incurred prior to March 7, 1927, and also prior to February 12, 1927, for the construction or reconstruction of roads or bridges in said County, evidenced by certain outstanding notes of said County of the aggregate face amount of \$100,000, dated the 1st day of September, 1928, and maturing the 30th day of June, 1929, and by certain outstanding notes of said County of the aggregate face amount of \$80,000, dated the 25th day of February, 1929, and maturing the 25th day of June, 1929, all of which notes are renewals of notes which were outstanding on the 7th day of March 1927, and also on the 12th day of February, 1927. Said outstanding notes shall be deemed to have been issued in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds of the bonds hereby authorized to be issued, and said notes and the indebtedness evidenced thereby are hereby ratified, notwithstanding that said notes were issued and said indebtedness incurred prior to the adoption of this order.

Section 3. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds when due shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 4. A statement of the County debt of Madison County has been filed with the Clerk of the Board of Commissioners of said County, and is open to public inspection.

Section 5. All expenses to be defrayed by means of the bonds hereby authorized are necessary expenses of the County of Madison, within the meaning of Section 7 of Article VII of the Constitution of North Carolina.

Section 6. This order shall take effect upon its passage, and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing order was finally passed on the 17th day of June, 1929, and was first published on the 21st day of June, 1929. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said order must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

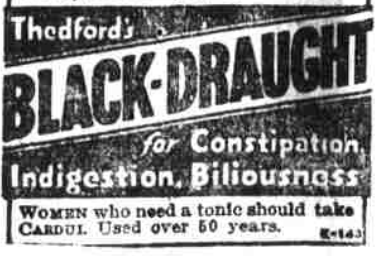

HALE, HAPPY AND HOPEFUL AT EIGHTY-NINE

John D. Rockefeller, for a long time richest man in the world, philanthropist, celebrated his eighty-ninth birthday in Florida recently. He was reminded, according to an interview appearing in the Kansas City Star, that Mr. Edison, on the occasion of his eighty-second birthday had said that there was no such thing as a happy person.

"My health is good," said Mr. Rockefeller. "My heart is all right, it gives me no trouble. I have many friends. I have learned how to enjoy life, and I am happy. I thank God for the blessings He has bestowed upon me. Sometimes I think we are ashamed to openly acknowledge His goodness."

"I'm getting a great deal out of life. I love everybody, and I haven't an enemy in the world that I know of. I have all the blessings any person could ask."

We believe we would be safe, in saying that Mr. Rockefeller has given away more money than any man that ever lived. His benefactions range from colleges to dime—four he gives every child he meets a new dime.

At the close of his golf game on his last birthday, the newspaper reporter reports this conversation with the multi-millionaire oil magnate: "What do you read, Mr. Rockefeller—the classics, detective stories or what?" "Oh, most everything. But nothing trashy. I like the Bible as well as anything."

"What message would you give to other folks in the twilight of life?" "I wouldn't give anybody else a message—I'd give it to myself," he replied; then, with a smile, he added, "I have ideals, but I don't know that I live up to them. Everybody should have ideals."

A dozen or so tourists crowded about Mr. Rockefeller smiled at them benignly. He addressed them saying: "You folks make me happy. This is food for me. This is health for me. This is happiness for me. Bless you—all of you."

We are sorry that Mr. Edison can not grow old, happy and hopeful as Mr. Rockefeller. Like Mr. Rockefeller, the great scientific wizard surely has a right to be happy if happiness can be won through service to others. He has contributed more perhaps than any other man who has lived within the last fifty years, unless it might be, Mr. Rockefeller, to the welfare, the comfort and the happiness of other people. The whole world must reverence him in his latter days for what he has done, scientifically, for mankind.

Mr. Rockefeller seems to have given the explanation for his happy old age, when he professes faith in God and love for everybody. Religion seems to be the key.

Ever since we read Mr. Edison's statement we have wished that somebody might bring him the message of hope and happiness that only Christianity can give. And we have wondered almost with a shudder, if this man who has money, friends, universal admiration amounting almost to adoration but who is most unhappy is but an example of the product of this scientific age and if so whether all mankind will some day find themselves in this economically satisfactory, socially comfortable, intellectually perfect but altogether unhappy condition. If scientific achievement leaves us, as it has left him, in this pitiable condition we should almost rather go back to kerosene lamps.

Mr. Rockefeller has pointed the way that we know stretched out to a bright and glorious future for those who keep their faith in spiritual things in God, in Christ, and in mankind. We have not heard two finer sermons than these two men against the background of their lives have preached.—Word and Way.
