DISTRICT WELFARE CONFERENCE

Will Be Held in Asheville, On October 10th.

The Western District Welfare Conference will be held in Asheville, Thursday, October 10th, according to an announcement by Mrs. F. B. Moss, Superintendent of Public Welfare in Rutherford county, who is district chairman for the conference. An excellent program on Problems of Children has been prepared. Among the speakers are such well-known specialists as Dr. Frank Howard Richardson, one of the leading child specialists in the country, who conducts the Children's Clinic at Black Mountain, Judge William M. York, of the Greensboro Juvenile Court, who is also chairman of the North Carolina committee on Juvenile Courts, and Dr. Harry W. Crane, of the faculty of the University of North Carolina and Director of the Division of Mental Health and Hygiene for the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare.

The conference will draw its attendance from the nineteen westernmost counties of the state. These include: Cleveland, Burke, Avery, Mitchell, McDowell, Rutherford, Polk, Henderson, Yancey, Madison, Buncombe, Haywood, Transylvania, Jackson, Swain, Macon, Graham, Cherokee, and Clay. A special invitation is extended to all county officials, social workers, welfare and civic organizations, women's clubs, and every one who is interested in social progress. The conference will be held at the Battery Park hotel.

The program for the day will start at ten o'clock in the morning, when Rev. G. Floyd Rogers, chairman of the Buncombe county board of public welfare, will welcome the conference. The first speaker will be Dr. Richardson, who will have as his subject, "Physical Factors Contributing to Behavior Problems
