The bottom is 660 yards long. new stream bed has been cut all he way through the bottom. It is from forty to eighty feet wide. This land was worth \$300.00 per acre and there has been over two acres completely destroyed. Three acres more are greatly damaged with another wash threatening in the same bottom. Valuating this land at \$300 per acre like the approximate loss and damage on this bottom land alone due to soil loss is approximately \$100/200. A number of Mr. Buck-ner's neighbors have had consider-able damage done by erosion also. We must do something to stop

erosion in our nation or we will sure see it a weaker nation than it is today. If the land perish, how shall man survive.
