White Pine Survey Resumed In County

Resumption of the survey of white pine in Madison County is announced by the United States Department of Agriculture office of Blister Rust Control in Asheville, according to County Farm Agent V. L. Holloway. After a two month lay-off mapping crews from the Belva section have begun mapping white pine on the Pisgah Forest, French Broad Division, west of Belva on Spring Mountain. About March 15 survey work will move back East of B and progress up the Shelton Laurel waterahed where some thirty-four quare miles of mountains rea be examined for white pine. The last December 31, a total of 6 acres were examined in Man County of which 25,208 count white pine in substantial quark 661 man days have been cryste date in the survey of white resources of this county.
