Born January 23, 1912, at Greensboro, Baley has practiced law at Marshall since 1933. He was a representative from Madison County in 1937 and 1939 legislatures, a delegate to the Republican national conventions of 1940 and 1948, and assistant chairman of the Republican party for western half of North Carolina from 1946 to 1950.

Baley was educated at Mars Hill College, University of North Carolina, where he graduated with A. B. and L. B. degrees in 1933. He served in the Navy from 1942 to 1946, returning to inactive duty with the rank of lieutenant commander.

The attorney is past master of French Broad Lodge 292, AF & AM and is superintendent of Sunday School and a deacon in the Baptist Church.

He married Miss Diana Chandley March 27, 1943 and they have two children, James M., III, age 5; and Kathy Dean, age 2.

Kerr Craige Ramsey of Salisbury, N. C., will serve as State Campaign Chairman for the 1950 Campaign in which the North Carolina Division of the American Cancer Society will seek to raise \$200,230 for the fight on cancer. Announcement of the appointment of Mr. Ramsey was made by Mr. J. T. Martin of Greensboro, President of the North Carolina Division of the American Cancer Society.

He said that he had watched the work of the American Cancer Society with considerable interest and that he is glad to have a part in helping to eradicate this dread disease. He further stated that cancer is an ever-growing menace attacking with force in every community among all classes of our citizens, rich and poor, young and old, powerful and lowly, and that it merits the interest and support of all the people in North Carolina. "The State-wide crusade has a two-fold purpose," he stated: "The raising of \$200,230 to carry on the program of RESEARCH, EDUCATION, and SERVICE, and to spread the message about cancer; that early detection and prompt treatment could save at least a third of our citizens who die of this disease each year."

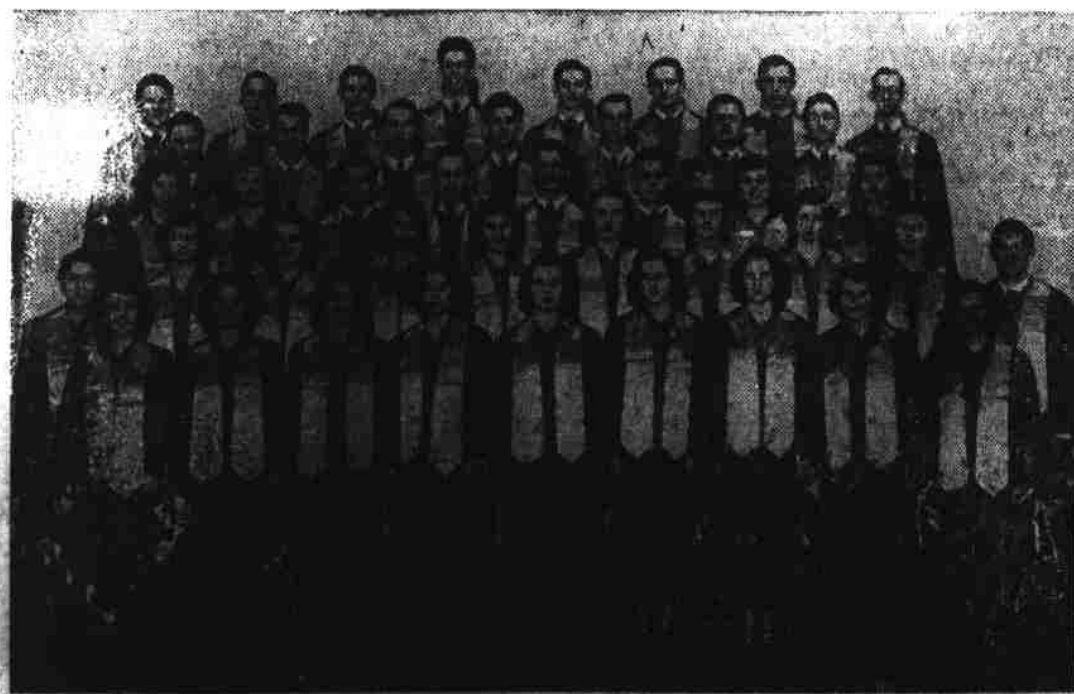
