The disputed election materials remained impounded pending the final ruling by the U. S. Court of Appeals and are still in federal custody.

A special venire of 125 jurors has been drawn from which to choose a jury to hear the case. The actual May term of criminal court will begin Monday, May 13, but court preliminaries will delay hearings of the "vote fraud" case until Wednesday.
