THE ART OF FIRE BUILDING The art of fire building has become a neglected if not a lost art. It might be thought that any one could build a fire. That is not the case. It takes ability to master the art of fire building. The wood has to be placed in the right position. The kindling put in the right place. To build a fire is no easy matter.

In years gone by the fireplace was used every day. In the winter time it warmed the house. To build a good winter-fire the back log had to be placed just right. The firewood in the right position and the material in between just right. The fire for cooking by the fire place was a little different. One object for a cooking fire was to get an abundance of live coals. It was quite an art to master fire building in the fire place or grate. The selection of the right kind of wood and kindling was part of the art.

With the coming of the kitchen range it took know-how to start a quick fire. Oil was not used for kindling in that day. There was the pot-bellied stove in the front room. It took more know-how to build a fire in it.

Today people depend on the oil heater, the thermostat control, the mechanical stoker and the electric switch. Now even the hardy and seasoned sportsmen carry along a portable gasoline stove. We may see in the ads any day now a specially controlled electric blanket as standard hunting equipment. for which a tobacco allotment is, or will be, established for 1958; (5) He must have had experience as a bona fide tobacco producer for at least two years during the past 5 years. Working in the tobacco as a hired hand or family helper does not count as eligible experience in meeting this requirement.

The (law) regulations provide that not more than one-fourth of one percent of the annual national quota may be used for establishing tobacco allotments on all new farms which meet all the eligibility requirement. The regulations also sets February 15 as the closing date whereby applications may be accepted for the current year. The amount of acreage which may be covered as a new farm allotment within the county depends on several factors; however, the regulations state that it shall not be more than 50 per cent of the allotted acreage on a similar old tobacco farm within the community.

In conclusion, Ramsey said that he and the County Commissioners were interested in helping to secure new farm tobacco allotments in all cases where the eligibility requirements were met and that interested producers who think they and the farm meet the requirements should contact the ASC office for complete details and file their applications prior to February 15.

"Wage increases are justified when they represent compensation for increased productivity. Similarly increased industry profits are justified to the extent that they represent increased operating efficiency. These are fundamental concepts which if violated must result in higher costs to farmers."
