"To FRED O. TILSON is dedicated the Charleston plant of Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation. "Tilson recognized impressive growth and potential in this area and untiringly advocated production located here to provide service. Moreover, in large measure, his own contributions in 35 years of customer relations work built the demand justifying this construction."

The presentation was made by John O. Logan, Vice-President, Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation.

Also presented Mr. Tilson was a beautifully bound album of letters from top officials and associates expressing appreciation for the splendid accomplishments he has made in the 35 years of faithful service and praising him for his untiring and friendly association with the company.

To Begin Construction
Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation will begin construction immediately on a \$13,000,000 chlorine and caustic soda plant at Charleston, Tenn., which is dedicated to Fred O. Tilson, of Marshall, Stanley de J. Osborne, president and chief executive officer, announced over the weekend. Production is scheduled for the end of 1961.

The new facility, using the Mathieson electrolytic cell for the production of chlorine and caustic, represents another step in the corporation's internal expansion program, Mr. Osborne said.

The new unit will have a capacity of 180 tons a day, and be located on about 600 acres on the Hivasaee River, a navigable tributary of the Tennessee River. Power for operations will be supplied by TVA.

Olin Mathieson now produces chlorine and caustic soda at Niagara Falls, N. Y., McIntosh, Ala., and Saltville, Va.

The corporation developed the Mathieson Stationary Mercury Cell process in which brine is broken into its component elements, sodium and chlorine, by passing a direct current through it in the specially designed electrolytic cell.

The new facility will allow Olin Mathieson to add to its ability to supply Southern markets and will serve as a source of chlorine and caustic soda for its manufacturing operations at Doe Run (Brandenburg, Ky.) and other points. The Chemicals Division of the corporation is now a major supplier of chemicals to such Southern industries as textiles, rayon, pulp and paper.

Mr. Osborne said about 12 persons will be required to operate the plant, most of whom will come from the Charleston area. This plant will be financed entirely from company funds.

It is anticipated that other industries supplying Southern producers and using Olin Mathieson raw materials will locate in this key market area, he added.

This new construction is in addition to the \$30,000,000 chemicals expansion program announced by the corporation a year ago. That announcement included improved chlorine production facilities at Niagara Falls as well as new facilities for petrochemicals at Brandenburg, Ky., and for the production of sulfuric acid at Joliet, Ill. Long range plans for the expansion of the McIntosh plant are not affected by this move.

The Chemicals Division now has under construction a hydrochloric acid plant at Saltville, Va. That plant will supply fuel for the Titan missile.

a few plays later, Bruce Marlor got Marshall out of a hole by running a quarterback sneak from his own 30, scooted 25 yards before being downed.

It was at this point that Max Edmonds took a pitchout and scampered around left end from the 41-yard stripe to score. Beautiful downfield blocking paved the way for Edmonds' great run. Billy Ray scored the extra point by falling on a loose ball in the end zone. Halftime score was Marshall 13; Tryon 0.

The Tornadoes scored a safety in the third quarter when Kenneth Ponder and Tommy Nix caught Quarterback Burrell in his own end zone, making the score 15-0. Midway the quarter, Max Edmonds burst over right tackle, cut back, and behind sharp blocking, raced 50 yards for Marshall's final touchdown. The extra point failed and Marshall led 21-0 at the end of the third period.

Tryon averted a shutout by scoring a touchdown in the final period when quarterback Harold Burrell heaved a 10-yard strike to elongated end Tommy Melton in the end zone for a touchdown.

"The victory was a great team effort," Coach Morton said after the game.

press conference in Greenville, N. C., and a brief speech at the Airport in Greensboro. After his address at McCormick Field in Asheville, Senator Kennedy plans to fly to Charlotte in the late afternoon, and then to Raleigh where he will appear on a State-wide television and radio broadcast at night.

This is the first time a candidate for President of the United States has campaigned in Western North Carolina since William Jennings Bryan. President Franklin D. Roosevelt appeared at the same McCormick Field in 1936, when he was here as President of the United States in connection with the dedication of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

It is expected that the appearance of Senator Kennedy, together with all the State and National Officials in North Carolina, will draw a tremendous crowd to McCormick Field. Officials request that persons attending arrive at McCormick Field as early as possible. The appearance of Senator Kennedy on the stand to make his address will be preceded by an entertainment program and the presentation of candidates and Democratic officials of Western North Carolina.

It is requested that all persons proceed directly to McCormick Field, as Senator Kennedy will not make a public appearance at the Airport upon arrival, and it is possible he may be transported from the Airport to the Field by helicopter.
