

Throughout the United States there are over 700,000 men and women who believe with Girl Scouting's founder, Juliette Gordon Low: "Youth is the time of the possible, the time when the mind is open and simple . . . It is for us the leaders to develop girls' courage, protect their confidence, and train their hands and their hearts to serve eagerly and purposefully their homes and their nation."

This event will precede a door-to-door campaign on April 21. Madison County is one of the 13 counties of the Pisgah Council area and is asked to contribute through its citizenry a share of the budget. \$682.00 is the amount considered to be the fair share according to population, girls served, and capacity to give of the communities affected.

We have had no special drive for funds in four years, except for the capital funds years, except for the capital funds drive last year for camp develop-Health Department including (1) ment. The county United Fund Beginners' Day Programs now beeffort did not provide the funds needed in either of these four years, and this failure caused considerable stress with the council finance group who was responsible for making the necessary adjustments. Solicitors will be calling on as many persons as possible, and with the shortage of volunteer help, the cooperation of all our citizens will be necessary. Letters are being written to many organized groups in the county, and the committee hopes that other fund-raising events will not be necessary. The Madison County portion is only 2% of the thir-

teen-county total. We hope that during the month we will be given opportunities to tell of the services of Pisgah Council and to inform communities of the Girl Scout program. Madison County has a girl population of 1,311 girls, white and non-white, between the ages of seven and seventeen, though we have fewer than 100 girls in the program at present. Volunteer adult leadership is necessary, and this requirement is also the inevitable restriction. If our county had no girls in Scouting at this time, we would most certainly want to support Pisgah Council for the contribution it is making toward helping girls of Western North Carolina become happy and resourceful citizens. 
