velope bearing no identification, and then placed in another pre-addressed envelope (requiring no postage) for mailing, or personal delivery to the county office. Write-in votes will be permitted. However, the total number of persons voted for including write-ins, must not exceed 5 or the ballot will be void.

The county community will meet on August 24 in the county office and complete the nominations for this year's elections. Where necessary the community committees will add additional persons to complete the slate. Also included will be nominations made by petitions signed and submitted by 10 or more eligible farmers. County and community committees currently serving may be included in the nominations.

The county committee will meet on September 12 for the purpose of counting the votes and officially announcing the results. The person receiving the most votes will be community chairman and delegate to the county convention, the second highest will be vice-chairman, and the third highest, regular member. The vice-chairman and regular member will be alternate delegates to the county convention. The first and second alternates will likewise be chosen by the number of votes received.

The elected community committee chairman, as delegates, will meet in a county convention September 20, to elect the county committee. All committeemen will take office on October 1, 1962. All persons who are participating, or are eligible to participate, in any of the ASCS programs are eligible to vote.

mained idle, however, and many of the students who were to begin classes at Marshall joined their parents and other citizens of the community in the protest.
Walnut citizens said Wed. morning that they are not opposed to consolidation as such, but termed the move by the Madison County Board of Education simply "a children swapping" arrangement.
Paul Ballard, chairman of the Walnut Protest Committee, said "we have a good school here — one of the best in the county." He estimated that about 600 students were enrolled in all the grades before the consolidation move.

One student produced her report card to prove that she had been assigned to Walnut High School for the 1962-63 term at the close of the past school session. One of the many placards fashioned by the students and posted on the schoolground steps said simply, "We're Not A'Goin'."

By 10:15 a. m., the some 150 seventh and eighth grade students from Marshall had been assigned to their classes at Walnut and school was progressing in an almost orderly fashion. A group of Walnut youngsters were conducting a pep rally in the auditorium and many of the Walnut residents remained on the school grounds for sometime. School adjourned before noon. R. L. Edwards, principal at Marshall said several children had arrived from Walnut for classes in c. s.

Vestie Baker of Big Pine, who echoed Ballard's sentiments about the quality of the school at Walnut, said one of his children was supposed to go to Marshall under the consolidation arrangement, but that he would not permit it.

"I don't see why the State Board of Health doesn't do something about that school anyhow," he said. "It is the only town in the United States that has its school in the middle of a river and its swimming pool on top of a mountain," Baker added.

Baker said he thought the consolidation idea was a good one, but that a new school convenient to both communities should be constructed.

Jeter Roberts said that the people of Walnut had asked for a principal for their school, and wanted to know why they hadn't got one. Grover Gillis, supervisor of Madison County schools, was present in the principal's office, but he said he was serving only as acting principal.

Gillis said no applications had been received from any qualified persons for the job of principal. He said he will remain at Walnut as acting principal "until they got a principal."

The first cause of action was a letter dated Nov. 10, 1959, which Cobb wrote to former Governor Luther Hodges and released to the press. In this letter he charged that election returns from Marling, shall precinct were fraudulent in the 1959 state-wide bond election.

(Two bond issues were defeated state-wide by narrow margins and Cobb attributed the defeat of both issues to the voting in Madison.)

The second cause of action was a letter dated May 6, 1960, which was mailed to the State Board of Elections and also released to the press.

In this letter Cobb repeated his charges and said the groundwork for fraud in the 1960 general election already had been laid.

During a sensational trial that consumed the first two weeks of July, 1961, Cobb attempted to prove that fewer than 939 persons (the number officially reported) voted in the Marshall precinct during the 1959 bond election.

The defense prepared subpoenas for 2,227 people believed to have been registered voters in the precinct at the time of the election. Sheriff E. Y. Ponder served 1,236 subpoenas and about 800 persons served actually appeared on the stand.

It was agreed by attorneys for both sides that the following account was substantially correct: 183 voted, 514 did not, 57 could not remember and 53 were not registered in 1959.

In charging the jury, Superior Court Judge J. Frank Huskins said that Cobb had the legal right to complain to the governor and to the State Board of Elections, but when he made the charges public by releasing them to the press he gave up whatever "qualified privilege" he might have had.

In a decision written by Chief Justice Emery B. Denny, the Supreme Court held that Judge Huskins erred in telling the jury Cobb "had neither an absolute privilege nor a qualified privilege to make a false defamatory statement about either of these plaintiffs to the newspapers of North Carolina."

According to evidence in the case, no poll book listing the names of all voters was kept at the Marshall precinct, but cards bearing the names of voters were taken from registration files and placed in a drawer.

Denny wrote that by their failure to keep a poll book, Ponder and the other two plaintiffs "clearly violated the mandatory provisions" of the election law. He said if a poll book had been kept it would have been a comparatively simple matter to have proven the correctness or the falsity of the returns in this precinct.

cubic feet, or 2,168,000 standard cords — 76 percent hardwoods and 24 percent softwoods. The principal softwoods are white pine and pitch pine. Together they account for over 60 percent of total softwood volume.

Vogengerger said the average sawtimber volume per acre in Henderson County is almost double the average for all forest lands in the Tennessee Valley. Seventy-five percent of Henderson's forest area has an adequate stocking of trees and 51 percent of the sawtimber volume is trees larger than 15 inches in diameter.

The Upper French Branch is the tenth watershed to be inventoried by TVA foresters. In addition, they have surveyed the forest resource in 81 of the 125 Tennessee Valley counties. They also made Valley-wide forest inventories in 1940, 1950 and 1960.

Vogengerger said reports on these surveys are available in his office or from the Director, TVA Division of Forestry Development, Norris, Tenn.
