RESCUE FAILS; 5 DIE

Opelika, Ala. - Bryant Jones, electrician, dropped his glasses into a ten-foot deep hole part filled with dry-carrying waste water at the Peppercell Company here. He climbed down to the pit through a small opening to try to retrieve them. Four companions, one at a time, squeezed through the opening in an attempt to rescue Jones, not realizing that the man ahead was in danger. All five perished, victims of poisonous hydrogen sulphide gas which rises from the waste water. The pit, normally covered, was opened to permit Mr. Jones to work on a pump.
