BOOSTERS SUMMER PROGRAM?

The Marshall Boosters Club is an active organization and has done much toward improving the facilities at the school. The club, organized less than a year ago, has already contributed more than a thousand dollars toward improvements, including an activity bus.

Although more than eighty interested persons have become members, more are needed and should join in helping improve our school.

The members are now toying with the idea of promoting a summer program on the Island. This is a great undertaking and will require all-out cooperation and support from businessmen and professional men and women. Although major in scope, we believe such a program would be most beneficial to the entire area.

It is during the summer vacation months that our young people have much time and energy with no supervised recreational program, save boys' baseball. If this program should become a reality, a full-time director, with assistants, could be obtained and a varied program of activities could be instigated.

In addition to Babe Ruth and Little League baseball, horseshoe pitching, ping-pong, Volley ball, basketball, badminton, marbles, croquet, checkers, shuffleboard and many other games could be enjoyed by all ages. Movies could be shown and smaller children could enjoy crayon drawing and such. Reading rooms could be provided and hiking could be enjoyed. This might sound fantastic and the above program might have to be "shaved" but in general, a summer program would make for better citizens — both physically and socially.

If the proposed program is too "heavy" perhaps three afternoons per week could be set aside for supervised recreation. This could still leave plenty of time for the boys and girls to help with necessary work at home. If you approve the idea, why not mention to a member of the Boosters Club — or better still — bring your ideas to the Boosters Club meeting on the Island next Monday night.

This proposed program has been discussed and will be further discussed — but — if Marshall is to realize a summer program this year something must be done immediately.

It's going to take money for equipment and a salary for the director, but overall benefits probably outweigh the expenses by a large margin.

We commend the Boosters Club on all its members have accomplished and have confidence that much more good will be seen from the members in days to come.
