

Moore Wins 93 Of 100 Counties In Runoff Saturday

SBA Presents \$64,350 Check To Complete Mato Transaction

MATO Packing Co., Inc.
Leases Tomato Packing Building

One of the largest business transactions in the history of Marshall took place here Wednesday morning when final papers involving the loan and leasing of the tomato packing building, now under construction near the Marshall bypass, were signed. Involved in the transaction were officials of the Madison County Development Board, Inc., MATO Packing Co., Inc., Citizens Bank and M. E. Maddox, attorney for Small Business Administration (SBA).

Mr. Maddox presented the SBA check for \$64,350 to Frank T. Moore, representing the Citizens Bank, which is handling the financing of the project. This check represents the participation of SBA in the loan. In addition to this check, \$7,150 has been loaned by the Citizens Bank, making a total loan for the county industry of \$71,500.

In addition to the loans, local money invested through the Madison County Development Board amounts to \$27,055, plus an additional \$10,000 invested by local participation in MATO Packing Co., Inc.

It was pointed out that the original loan was made through the Richmond Regional Office of SBA. Access roads to the site were constructed by the State Highway Department at a cost of approximately \$10,000. Plans call for the construction of a parking lot for the building.

The building, totaling 200x88 ft., through the Madison County Development Board, has been leased by the MATO Packing Co., Inc. Final papers involving the lease were signed at the meeting Wednesday.

Officials taking part in the signing of papers included E. C. Teague, president, MATO Packing Company, Inc.; J. Leonard Baker, secretary, MATO; Liston B. Ramsey, treasurer, MATO; Zeno H. Ponder, president, Madison County Development Board, Inc.; D. M. Robinson, secretary, Development Board; Frank T. Moore, Citizens Bank; C. E. Mashburn, attorney for MATO, Industrial Board and Citizens Bank; Harry Silver, who represented Madison County Farm Office; and Attorney Maddox, of SBA.

The 200x88 ft. building which will also have an 8-foot ramp, is expected to be completed in time for this year's tomato crop. Water lines have been completed and work is progressing rapidly.

The necessary machinery has been purchased and is ready for delivery and installation as soon as the building is roofed.

Preyer Defeated By Moore Than 185,000 Votes

Supporters of I. Beverly Lake have finally scored a political victory over the forces of Gov. Terry Sanford by providing the muscle which gave the Democratic nomination for governor to Dan K. Moore.

Moore scored a whopping 97,000-vote margin over Preyer in the east, 33,000 in the Piedmont and 55,000 in his native western area. He carried all but seven counties.

In the flush of his overwhelming triumph over Richardson Preyer—Sanford's candidate—Moore Sunday credited Lake with playing a "tremendous" role in the outcome.

Lake, defeated twice by Sanford in 1960 and eliminated in the first primary May 30, endorsed Moore in Saturday's runoff and appeared on television in his behalf.

"It's pretty obvious that the people who supported me supported Judge Moore," Lake declared. "That shows the margin of victory."

Whether or not it was a repudiation of Gov. Sanford's administration, as Lake described it, Moore's victory was strong and deep throughout the state.

Unofficial returns from all but four of the 2,164 precincts gave Moore, a 58-year-old attorney and former Superior Court judge from Canton, 480,120 votes to Preyer's 394,241.

For Moore, it was a gain of some 22,000 votes over his total in the first primary when he finished a close second to Preyer. In that balloting, third place Lak drew 217,000.

Robert Scott Is Easy Victor Over Clifton Blue For Lt.-Governor

Madison County voters, like voters throughout North Carolina, gave for a few counties, gave Dan K. Moore an overwhelmingly large victory in the gubernatorial election. Richardson Preyer defeated Governor Sanford in the second primary last Saturday.

Official county totals reveal that the former judge from Canton, received 2,367 votes to Preyer's 401. In the first Primary, Moore also defeated Preyer. The tabulation of the May 30th Primary was 2,765 for Moore and 2,606 for Preyer.

In the Lieutenant-Governor's contest, Robert W. Scott defeated Clifton Blue in Madison County, 1,939 votes to 687. In the May 30th Primary, Scott also defeated Blue, 4,594 to 315.
