## Savings Bonds Program Sets A Peacetime Record

In 1964 the U. S. Savings Bonds Program in North Carolina achieved its best all-around peacetime performance in its 24-year history.

For the second consecutive year North Carolina exceeded its annual dollar quota. Total sales of Series E and H Bonds for the year amounted to \$51,769,451, which is 100.5 percent of the 1964 goal of \$50 million — the largest volume of sales recorded for any year since 1955.

Craig L. Rudisill, Jr., County Volunteer Chairman, in releasing this report pointed out that Madison County was one of 54 counties making its quota for the year. Bond sales in the county totaled \$170,827, which is 104.7 percent of its last year's goal of \$163,200.

In addition to its record sales performance, the Savings Bonds Program experienced substantial growth in the Payroll Savings Plan for Bonds last year. As the result of over 100 campaigns conducted in leading industries of the state, 17,781 new purchasers of Bonds were added to the Payroll Savings Plan.

The news and advertising media of N. C. continued as a pace setter for the nation in the amount of time and space donated for the use of Savings Bonds material.

In commenting on the past year's achievements, State Director, Walter P. Johnston, expressed the appreciation of the U. S. Treasury and its Savings Bonds Division for the great service rendered by volunteers, banks, industry, news and advertising media, and other organizations in the promotion of the Bonds Program. Johnston stated, "We are indeed fortunate in having the support of so many prominent state and local business leaders without whom the continued growth and success of the Bonds Program would be impossible."

## Use Of Typewriter In Filing Income Returns Preferred

TOPIC: Form 941 Requirements

Now it's a machine that can "read!"

Internal Revenue District Director J. E. Wall cited this advance in automation in urging N. C. employers, to use, if possible, typewriter or other business machines to complete their Form 941 reports of income taxes withheld and social security taxes.

However, Mr. Wall emphasized that handwritten returns will be accepted by Internal Revenue if typing cannot be employed.

He said the Social Security Administration will use an "Optical Character Recognition" machine to "read" the Schedule A of Form 941 and related continuation sheets and enter the information directly into its electronic data processing system for maintaining social security records.

The machine cannot read colored inks, handwriting, or handprinting. Hence, the Administration has requested that machine typing be employed if possible.

Complete instructions are included in the Form 941 package mailed to employers.
