We join with everyone in Madison County in congratulating Coach J. C. Wallin and the Mars Hill High School Wildcats on winning the State Class "A" Baseball Championship.

SAFE, SOUND INVESTMENT

Although county schools are dismissed for the summer months, the responsibility of maintaining and protecting the schools remains.

Our understanding is that the board of education has inserted into the budget an amount for the installation of fire and burglar alarm warning systems for county schools. Jerry T. Melton, manager, Asheville Office, National Fire and Burglar Systems, Inc., has also discussed the matter with our county commissioners. "I feel that they were favorably impressed with the decision of the Board of Education to insert the equipment into its budget," Mr. Melton says.

The equipment will sound a loud siren which will be heard for a radius of one mile or more from the school in the event a burglar tries to break into the building as well as the same siren to summon assistance in the event of a fire. Experience will show that the losses due to burglary and vandalism in the past will be virtually eliminated as the alarm offers 99.9% security and is of a tamper proof nature.

Each year in this country over 100,000 men, women and children are disfigured and burned in home and school fires and we feel sure that the people of Madison County will wholeheartedly support the decision to protect their children from this hazard as it gives protection for the most prize possession they own, the lives of their children.

In many parts of the country similar equipment is being installed on a mandatory basis by the school systems and therefore Madison County's school system should be congratulated in its installation decision as they have seen fit to protect their school system although the equipment is not yet mandatory by law.

If at all feasible, we hope the commissioners and the board of education will see that this added protection is in use when schools reopen later this year.

ASCS Performance Work Is Started

Determining compliance with the Production Adjustment Program provisions on each individual farm within the County is one of the major jobs assigned to ASCS, according to Ralph Ramsey, Office Manager for the Madison County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. He states that this year's performance job will involve more work and time than during normal years in that ASCS field reporters will be delineating farm boundaries on a new flight of County photography when they visit the farms to measure the tobacco acreage and other land uses. Ramsey explained that measuring of acreage diverted under this year's Feed Grain Program was started during the early part of May and is practically completed at this time but that the measuring of tobacco acreage and the work on the new photographs is just now under way. Some 25 ASCS field representatives will be used in determining farm performance work within the County this year. Approximately half of this personnel have completed their training program and are now working. The others are in the midst of their training program and are expected to be ready to start working on June 10.

Each farm owner or operator can contribute much to the success and early completion of this year's performance job by cooperating fully with the reporter when on-the-farm contact is made.

In conclusion, Ramsey said that a vast majority of Madison County Farmers are very cooperative with ASCS representatives visiting their farms for which ASCS is very appreciative.

N. S. WHITAKER DIES TUESDAY; FUNERAL TODAY

Was Former Mayor, Civic Leader Of Mars Hill

Neil S. Whitaker, 73, former mayor and alderman of Mars Hill, died Tuesday morning, June 8, 1965 in an Asheville hospital following a long illness.

He was a native of Raleigh, a resident of Mars Hill since 1911, and a former merchant, at one time connected with the old Bank of Mars Hill. Prior to his retirement three years ago, he had served 33 years with the Asheville office of the Federal Land Bank.

He was a past president of the Civic Club of Mars Hill.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Estelle Kibrell Whitaker; two sons, Neil Stewart Jr., of Savannah, Ga., and Lawrence K. Whitaker of Greenville, Ohio; three grandchildren and a great-grandson.

Services were held at 2 p. m. today (Thursday) in Mars Hill Baptist Church, of which he was a deacon and Sunday School teacher and superintendent.

10-Pound Catfish Is Caught By Hand Here On Tuesday

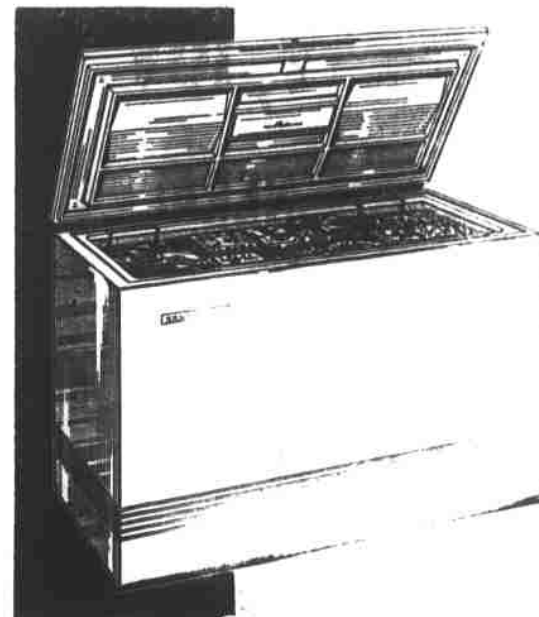
