Swain Is Acquitted On Charges In Court Mon.

Weight Of Evidence Favors Solicitor Charged With Drunken Driving

Superior Court solicitor Robert S. Swain was acquitted of a charge of drunken driving Monday, following a day-long non-jury trial in General County Court in Ashe-

Swain, surrounded by a crowd of well-wishers, walked from the courtroom smiling broadly.

Judge Robert B. Willson handed down the verdict of not guilty after 13 witnesses testified that Swain was not intoxicated on the night of Sept. 13, when he was arrested on Charlotte Street by State Highway Patrolman Gary W. Church.

S. Thomas Walton, a fellow attorney, testified that he and Swain had been dove hunting at Leicester and had been together continuously since 4 p. m. He said that from then until Swain was arrested about 10 p. m., neither of them had consumed any alcoholic bev-

Walton testified that after leaving Leicester, he and Swain drove to Asheville and stopped at a drive-in for a sandwich and a cup of coffee. Then, he said, they went to the courthouse and talked
