The station has Federal Communication sanction and is a conditional member of Intercollegiate Broadcasting System, an association of college radio stations.

It is looking for new call letters, since the WMHC letters used when Mars Hill College operated a station in 1957-58 are now the property of Mount Holyoke College in Massachusetts.

Ellmore, assisted by David Cunningham of Arden and Michael Webb of Silver Springs, Md., has been working on the project two years. A studio containing \$4,000 in equipment and \$1,000 in furnishings has been built in a former storage room on the third floor of the Fine Arts Building.

State College, from West Virginia, Sept. 13 at Mars Hill.

Other changes are the moving of a popular professor, Dr. Richard Hoffman, from the political science department into a new administrative post as vice president for academic affairs. Similarly education professor Dr. William Sears has been named dean of students. Sears replaces Dean William Lynch. Lynch will head a new counseling center set up this year to assist students with personal problems. The center will also offer aptitude and vocational testing.

A new addition to the campus is a \$350,000 dormitory which was formally opened last Friday. Gibson Dormitory is the college's first in a series of self-governing residence halls. The fully-carpeted dorm will house 64 seniors.

In addition, the students will confront 99 on the current teaching faculty - a record high. The faculty held at retreat and workshop sessions last week-end at the Lake Junaluska assembly grounds.

In the first two years of studies, Mars Hill offers students a basic core of courses in the humanities, sciences, languages and arts. The following junior and senior years, students concentrate on the majors and supplementary studies.

In the past two years, the school's curriculum has been invigorated by a number of programs which send students out into the community. This provides the unique learning experience of relating classroom theory and practical knowledge to the enrichment of community life. These programs are coordinated by the college and Community Development Institute which has received national recognition.

The person receiving the most votes will be ASC community chairman, second highest will be vice-chairman, third highest will be regular member, and fourth and fifth highest in votes will be first and second alternates.

First duty of the newly-elected chairman, vice-chairman, and members will be to serve as delegates to the county convention at which vacancies on the Madison County ASC Committee will be filled, according to County ASC Committee Chairman, Emory Robinson. The county convention will be held on Thursday, September 25, at 10:00 a. m., in the ASCS office at Marshall.

In general, ASC community committees assist in carrying out the program responsibilities assigned by the ASC county committee and in informing farmers of purposes and provisions of programs administered by the Agricultural and Conservation Service.
