

Marshall Girls Defeated In Tournament

Nebo and Robbinsville received the scares of their lives but survived last quarter rallies to turn back Murphy and Marshall in the District 8 Girls Basketball Tournament at Roberson High Tuesday night. In the opener Nebo edged Murphy, 42-39, and in the nightcap time ran out on a desperation surge by the Lady Tornados of Marshall as Robbinsville won, 33-31.

In the final stanza, however, Marshall quickly gained the initiative and was back in the running with four minutes left when Kathy Tipton hit two baskets and a free throw to cut the edge to 30-24. When Carolyn Davis made a steal and scored the Robbinsville edge was two, 30-28, with 3:15 remaining.

Margaret Jenkins hit a free throw for Robbinsville with 3 minutes left to make it 31-28 but Debbie Mayhew retaliated with a field goal to cut it to 31-30 with 2:45 left.

Lucille Brown scored a field goal to make it 33-30. Kathy Tipton's free throw made it 33-31. At the buzzer Miss Tipton was fouled but missed both opportunities. Robbinsville was the victor.
