4-H'ers To Attend Conference

Two outstanding 4-H'ers from Madison County will join 250 boys and girls from seven states at the 17th annual 4-H Regional Resource Development Conference at Fontana Village, June 5-9.

The delegates are Miss Berta Sluder, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lon Sluder, Route 5, Marshall; and Jerry Cody, son of Mr. and Mrs. Plumer Cody, Route 5, Marshall. In addition to the 4-H'ers, Mrs. Patsy Davis, 4-H leader of the Pioneer 4-H Club in Madison County, will attend the conference as an adult leader.

The theme of the Conference is "Dawn of Our Day." In keeping with the theme, the 4-H'ers will study the natural resources of the Valley—soils, forests, atmosphere, water, minerals, wildlife and human. Specialists from the land-grant universities of the Valley states will serve as resource leaders.

A major goal of the Conference is to help 4-H'ers understand how their future is related to the proper development and use of these resources. Another emphasis of the Conference is to provide leadership opportunities for young people in resource development.

The delegates, two from each of the 125 TVA counties, were selected on the basis of their achievement in 4-H and leadership abilities.

This 4-H event is sponsored by the Extension Services of the landgrant universities of the seven Tennessee Valley states, the Tennessee Valley Association of Test Demonstration Farm Families and the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Fontana Village was originally built to house workers who constructed Fontana Dam in 1944. Now the Village is operated as a resort and is headquarters for the conference.
