## Meat Stretching Ideas Help Trim Food Costs

**RALEIGH** -- With shoppers' concern for meat prices these days, it's a good idea to stretch the meat you buy.

How to do it? One good way is to prepare the meat you buy at a low temperature so that it doesn't shrink, says Mrs. Ruby Uzzle, extension consumer marketing economist, North Carolina State University.

Meat does shrink somewhat as it cooks, but low temperature keeps the shrinkage to a minimum. If you use a meat thermometer, you won't overcook the good meat you buy. And you'll save meat flavor and keep it juicy at the same time.

The next way you buy is to use all of it. Refrigerate meat promptly when you go home from the market.

Use leftovers in any number of good tasting dishes. Crumble leftover bacon over fresh-cooked vegetables for more flavor; use leftover bits of roast for an excellent sandwich spread.

It is estimated that we waste two-thirds of a pound of food per person per day in the United States, Mrs. Uzzle adds. Don't do that if you want to stretch the family food dollar.

When you think of stretching the meat you buy these days, you may also think of adding other foods to make it seem like more.

The "stretcher" may be vegetables, either dry or fresh, or a starchy food. And the "stretcher" varies in cost and food value, too.

Sometimes we pay a high price for having the "stretcher" and the spices measured out for us. We call it convenience.

Potatoes and vegetables are the old standby nutritious stretchers. Salt pork, bacon bits, along with the brown in the pan, become the gravy or sauce to give an illusion of meat on the table just as the bit of ham does in scalloped potatoes. We use vegetables to stretch the meat portion in soups and stews.

**REVIVE FLOWERS**  
A teaspoon of detergent added to cut flowers will revive them if wilted, according to Cornell University's Floriculture Department.

**GROWING FLOWERS**  
If you want to grow tall flowers for cutting, especially roses, it may be best to put them in beds by themselves, suggest N. C. State University horticulturists. A mulch over the entire bed will conserve moisture and help keep down grass and weeds.

## No Arsenal Needed For Bug Control in Garden

Controlling insects in the home garden is a job that can be handled by one or two good insecticides. There's no need to stockpile an arsenal for the job.

Gardeners, especially the less experienced ones, may get "carried away" with all the materials available for killing bugs and feel compelled to buy some of each one. This multiplies the danger of having poisons around the house, in addition to increasing costs.

Dr. H. E. Scott, extension entomologist at North Carolina State University, said two materials that have broad application for garden use are malathion and sevin. Another product, Gardona, is also available for general use but has more limited application.

"Either malathion or sevin should provide adequate insect control in most gardens," Dr. Scott said. "Both are safe when used as directed by the manufacturer."

Aphids, which are always a problem on a wide variety of vegetables, are best controlled with malathion.

However, sevin may give better control on such pests as the bean beetle, tomato fruitworm and the imported cabbageworm (cabbage butterfly).

Malathion is available as an emulsifiable concentrate, wettable powder or dust. Sevin comes as a wettable powder, dust or as a "flowable" formulation to be mixed with water.

Dr. Scott said gardeners will no longer be able to find garden insecticides containing DDT. This product was officially removed from the market effective Dec. 31, 1972. He added that gardeners shouldn't regard this as much of a loss since the other products that are available are more effective in garden insect control. NCSU hasn't suggested using DDT in home gardens for several years.

Scott cautioned that malathion, sevin and all other insecticides should be used only as directed on the container label; that the materials should be kept well out of reach of children, preferably locked up; and that empty containers should be disposed of properly.
