The Sunday School Lesson

MINISTERS OF RECONCILIATION
September 23, 1973
LESSON TEXT:

2 Corinthians 5:11 to 6:10
It has often been said that the Bible is English in its purest form. Granted that that is the case, we modern, bristling Americans tend towards the simple, clipped statement rather than —even—the verbose, flowery language of Victorian times, then considered the purest of English. How much greater, then, is the distance between the language of Biblical times, with its oft-repeated translations, and our forthright English of today!

To the modern student, the Bible is repetitive in many cases, and—because of this—many telling points become

obscure to all but the most discerning student.

This was the case with some of the most important of Paul's doctrines. How perceptive we must be, in order to get to the heart of each particular message! But when, through earnest discussion and prayer, augmented by devoted study, we master the language barrier, then—and only then—will we be able to inspire others with Paul's concept of his Gospel!

Within the confines of our study of 2 Corinthians, verses 16 through 21 contain the message of reconciliation for mankind, through the death of Christ, the Saviour, for all sinners who repented and reconciled themselves to God. This was the essence of Paul's teaching, and, to lend weight to his assertions, he did not hesitate to hold himself up as an example of himself living, redeemed by the virtues of Christ.

Paul felt a deeply personal obligation to testify, to preach and to teach—to win souls to his Cause. This was the outcome of his own personal experience—his meeting with the Lord on the Damascus Road (Acts 9). The Paul who had persecuted Christians was dead! In his stead stood a stalwart minister of the faith, fearless in his condemnation of the wicked, enthusiastic in his purpose of conversion of outsiders to that faith!

The Church is called upon today to minister to all God's creatures in the way of Paul! To bring light into lives where before there was only darkness. And to do it proudly and fearlessly, prompted by love and conviction and with dedication, as exemplified in Paul's ministry.

Repentance and reconciliation—the cornerstones of the Christian movement! They imply responsibility on the sinner's side to take the first step to companionship with God, repentance, and the responsibility on the side of the Church to act as God's agent in reconciling lost souls to Him!

But before we can fulfill these two requirements we must be prepared to enter into a loving partnership with all mankind. "Christ so loved the world," was the basis of Christ's own ministry on earth. From the shadow of the cross we are constrained to emulate Him in this regard.

Only in so doing can He come into His own—through each individual professing the faith, and conducting his life accordingly. For the church is made up of people, and it's effectiveness (or ineffectiveness) is a reflection of their dedication...or lack of it. How effective is YOUR church?
