The Marshall Book Club met Monday evening, June 17th, in the home of Mrs. J.L. McElroy.

Mrs. Wade Huey reviewed "What's Right With the World" by Dr. Marcus Bach.

"What's Right With the World" is not a question, but an affirmation. It is a matter of transfigured moment memories reviewed as meaningful encounters seen in a new light, life holding a margin for never-ending creativity. Practically anyone may tell you what's wrong with the world—crime, pollution, war—but Marcus Bach insists that each man can make his personal world a place of joy, adventure, and wonder. Relying on his own widespread travels from the rocky islands of the South

Pacific to the Great Barrier reef; from a Moscow church to college campuses, Dr. Bach reveals the building blocks available to all of us for making our world anew.

Through dramatic case histories—a retired tailor, a

multiple sclerosis victim, an out-of-work engineer, a bitter divorcee, an alienated college student—Dr. Bach demonstrates how some troubled people changed their entire lives, in a practical, positive way. All were able to look

beyond their personal afflictions to constant opportunity for meaningful work and contributions and see "What's Right With the World."

Dr. Bach is frequently referred to as the foremost authority on contemporary religious movements. A well-known leader in the Unity movement, he has lectured around the world and written countless articles. He lives with his wife in Palos Verdes Estates, Calif.

Notice is hereby given that Westco Telephone Company (Applicant) has made application to the North Carolina Utilities Commission for authority to increase its rates and charges for intrastate telephone service in North Carolina. The present and proposed main station rates and amount of increase by exchanges are as follows:

In addition to the basic rates and charges set out above and other monthly charges directly related to these rates, the Company proposes increases in the rates and charges for extensions, directory listings, PBX and key system components, key system lines, miscellaneous equipment, and service connection and other non-recurring charges.

The Company also proposes adjustment of zone charges, increases in miscellaneous mileage charges, and elimination of charges for colored hand sets.

Details of the proposed changes are available at any Westco Telephone Company business office in North Carolina or at the North Carolina Utilities Commission, Ruffin Building, One West Morgan Street, Raleigh, North Carolina, where a copy of said application is available for public review.

In justification of its application, Applicant alleges that its last rate adjustment was based on a twelve-month period ending December 31, 1971, that it has been faced with increased costs in virtually all aspects of its operations, and in addition has made substantial investments in its facilities for the purpose of increasing and improving its services to the public; and that the present rates are insufficient to provide the Applicant with a fair and reasonable rate of return on the fair value of its property and therefore needs \$501,746 of additional revenue.

Notice is given that the matters for investigation and hearing in this general rate case, when heard, shall include not only a determination as to whether or not the proposed rates are just and reasonable, but also a determination as to whether or not some or all of Westco's presently existing rate structure should be changed.

The Commission has set said application for hearing at locations and dates for certain purposes as follows:

a. Sylva, North Carolina, on December 10 and 11, 1974 at 9:00 a.m. in the Courtroom, Jackson County Court House, Sylva, North Carolina. The Commission will hear the testimony of public witnesses, and the testimony and cross-examination of the Applicant, the intervenors, and the Commission Staff.

b. Asheville, North Carolina, on December 12 and 13, 1974 at 9:00 a.m. in the Courtroom, Ninth Floor, Buncombe County Court House, Court House Plaza, Asheville, North Carolina. The Commission will hear the testimony of public witnesses and the testimony and cross-examination of the Applicant, the intervenors, and the Commission Staff.

The Commission requires that Westco Telephone Company inform its customers of the following procedures by which their comments regarding the rate application can be made part of the record of the case upon which the Commission must base its decision. Persons desiring to intervene in the matter as formal parties of record should file a motion under North Carolina Utilities Commission Rules R1-6, R1-17, and R1-19 ten days prior to the hearing. Persons desiring to present testimony for the record should appear at the public hearing. Persons desiring to send written statements to the Commission should submit their statements prior to the hearing, and should include any information which those persons wish to be considered by the Commission Staff in its investigation of the matter. The contents of letters and petitions will be received in the official file as statements of position. Specific facts will be considered on the basis of testimony presented at the public hearing. Interventions or statements shall be addressed to the North Carolina Utilities Commission, P. O. Box 991, Raleigh, North Carolina 27602.

North Carolina law provides that the Attorney General may represent the using and consuming public in proceedings before the Utilities Commission.
