RALEIGH REPORT

Last week's Supreme Court decision that students may sue school board members for damages for intentionally violating the student's constitutional rights may cause some school board members to resign. Other potential school board candidates may have second thoughts about running for office.

The Supreme Court specified two conditions that must be met if the board member is to avoid paying damages to a student. He must have acted "sincerely in the belief he was doing right" and he must know the "basic constitutional rights" of the students.

There are several problems connected with the Supreme Court decision. What are "basic constitutional rights" of a student? Even the Supreme Court cannot agree on this. Will a school board member be liable for disciplinary action dealt out by a teacher or a principal? These and many other questions must be answered before the liability status of a school board member can be clearly defined.

As soon as the legal implications of this decision can be evaluated, the General Assembly will have to try to clarify the liability status of a board member.

And all this came about because two girls were suspended from school for pouring two bottles of beer in the punch at a school party.

The educational establishment was further jolted last week when the Legislature's Fiscal Research staff, after making a study of the Department of Public Instruction, recommended that the State Board of Education be abolished and that the State Superintendent be appointed by the Governor rather than elected.

These two proposals are not apt to draw much support.

On Dean's List

Robert R. Chapman, Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, has announced that 24 Mars Hill College students were named to the Dean's List for the fall term.

Named to this honor, a student must maintain a grade point ratio of 3.5 or better on a minimum of 12 semester hours of study, and not receive any grade below a "C" for one or both semesters. Mars Hill bases its grades on a four-point system, with an "A" representing four points, a "B" representing three points, and so forth.

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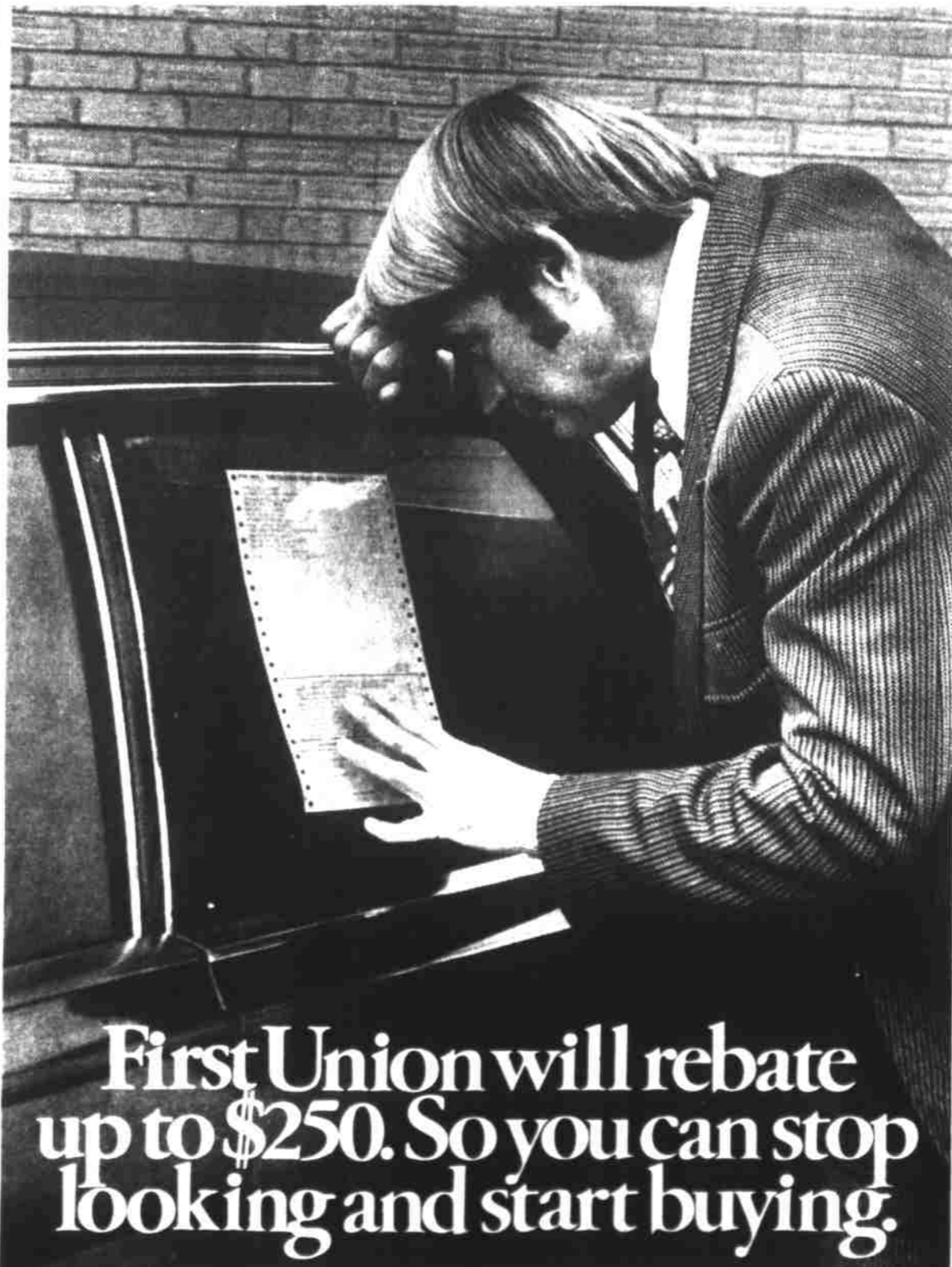
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
