### Rabies Clinics Tuesday

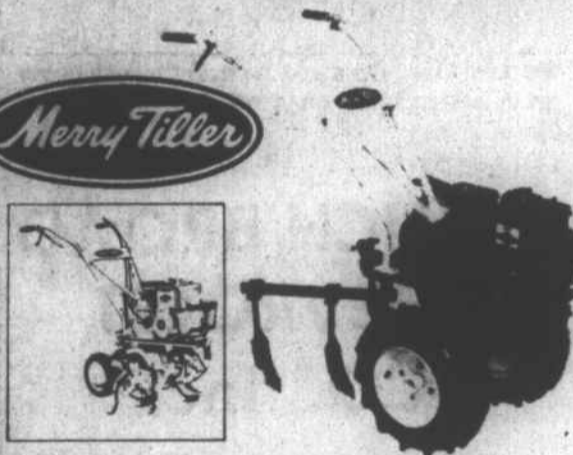
The Madison County Health Department will be holding three rabies clinics in the county next Tuesday as follows:

Madison County Health Dept., 3:15 p.m. to 5:15 p.m. There will be a qualified veterinarian conducting these clinics and everyone is urged to bring their dogs and cats to the clinic in their area to be vaccinated against rabies. A fee of \$3 per animal will be charged.
