## **Sociobiologist Will Speak** At Mars Hill On March 25

Dr. Tom Barash, professor of zoology and psychology at the University of Washington in Seattle, is the leader in a new controversial field sociobiology. Sociobiologists in genetic and evolutionary factors control human social behavior. He will be at Mars Hill College March 25 for a public lecture at 8 p.m. in Belt Auditorium. He will also meet with biology, zoology and psychology students during the day.

Dr. Barash, a native of New York City, earned his bachelor's degree at Harpur College in Binghamton, N.Y., and his master's and Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin. At the very young age of 33, he has published over 80 scientific papers in this new field as well as authored the books "Whisperings Within" and "Sociobiology and Behavior" which have become standards in this new field. He has been invited to study at the Center for Advanced Studies of Behavioral Science at Stanford University, and has received numerous grants and fellowships from the National Science Foundation as well as other agencies.
