The final scoring for the meet was Franklin 61, Cherokee 44, Madison 34 and Swain 13.

The Madison High Lady Patriot track squad had their best showing ever March 27 at West Henderson in the Little MAC conference meet. The Lady Patriots finished second in the meet and won the track events by scoring 83 points, which as three more than the winner, West Henderson. than state qualifying time. Coach Ricky McDevitt commented that he was well pleased with the meets and thought they were good showings for the team. Coach McDevitt feels that the team is still very young, but by midseason should be very tough.
